### State PSSA Athletics Carnival






### Book Review

KS and 2C enjoyed an afternoon of robotics this week.


Robotics is a great way to foster curiosity, confidence, collaboration and perseverance.

Students used "Mabot" a colourful, easy-tooperate, friendly little robot.


"Mabot" is the perfect tool for teaching computational thinking, problem-solving, engineering and coding while having fun!











KM have been enjoying the jacaranda flowers in the playground so we decided to create our own jacaranda trees using finger painting.























# 1R PHONICS

- · Treating members of the school community differently due to aspects such as their religion or disability.
- · Inappropriate and time wasting communication.
